In this edition, we will highlight the key areas where we are expanding and the impact it will have on our programs and services.

Expanding our Street Outreach Program

Thanks to increased funding from the City of Detroit, our Street Outreach Program has grown. We have expanded our Street Outreach Team from two staff members to three, allowing us to provide outreach services on more days. We have also shifted to "navigation" outreach beyond "basic



needs" outreach, allowing NOAH to follow clients through to secure housing.

Introducing the Peer Community Builder

We are proud to announce the creation of the Peer Community Builder position, made possible by funding from the United Way's Race Equity Fund. This role is designed to amplify the voices of individuals with lived experience in homelessness. The Peer Community Builder will collaborate with clients to gather feedback on current and future programs, ensuring that their input shapes our initiatives.

Thriving Partnership with Metro Food Rescue

We are delighted to partner with Metro Food Rescue as a regular drop-off site. They have provided us with an abundance of bread, snack items, and



prepared food, which has greatly supplemented the meals we offer in our bag lunches. If you need sandwich bread for making lunches, please reach out to us. This partnership reinforces our commitment to addressing food insecurity and providing nourishing meals to our clients.

These developments mark significant milestones for our organization and the community we serve. By expanding our programs, including diverse voices in decision-making, and fostering meaningful partnerships, we can make a lasting impact on the lives of those experiencing homelessness. The Journey: Lisa's Path Home

When Lisa (name changed for her privacy) first came to us in the spring of 2021, she was unsheltered and struggling to access her income. Like many of our clients, Lisa did not have identification documents let alone a place to store such documents. However, NOAH was able to work with Adult Protective Services to review her

guardianship and ultimately get Lisa a new public guardian. This allowed her to access her income and take care of some of her own needs. It was a first step to building trust with Lisa, and this foundation would make her comfortable coming in to the community center for other needs.



Lisa quickly became a beloved member of our community center, dancing through her days with all her belongings in tow. NOAH services are client-centered and client-directed. So Lisa let us know when she was ready for the next step: finding her own apartment. With the assistance of NOAH caseworkers, Lisa was able to get replacement vital documents and connect with housing navigation to work towards her goal. Along the way, there were many challenges to overcome, including mental health and substance use issues (plus having to get yet another guardian!) However, we were with Lisa every step of the way, offering consistency and stability.

The path to housing is a long one, but finally, in April of 2023, Lisa received the keys to her very own apartment. When she returned to NOAH shortly after being housed, she was practically bursting with joy. She showed us her keys and talked about how well rested she was now that she had a safe, stable place to call home. No two paths are the same to stable housing, and we couldn't have been prouder to walk alongside Lisa on her personalized journey.
